Andy Goldsworthy

Learning Objective:

Create an outdoor sculpture/installation inspired by the artist Andy Goldsworthy.

Success Criteria:

I can use my thinking and problem solving skills to create a sculpture or installation.





- Find various objects outside such as stones, leaves and pebbles
- Arrange these in an interesting way (taking inspiration from Andy Goldsworthy)
- If you don't have a garden you can create an indoor sculpture/installation using man—made objects instead
- Such as toys, clothes, shoes, cutlery, cups, food tins, cans, crisp packets saucers, mobile phone, ornament (anything "made" and not natural)

Andy Goldsworthy OBE (born 26 July 1956) is a British sculptor, photographer and environmentalist who produces site-specific sculptures and land art situated in natural and urban settings. He lives and works in Scotland.

The materials used in Andy Goldsworthy's art often include brightly coloured flowers, icicles, leaves, mud, pinecones, snow, stone, twigs, and thorns. He has been quoted as saying,

"Movement, change, light, growth, and decay are the life-blood of nature, the energies that I try to tap through my work."
